Walk beside the Yallahs River from Wallenford coffee factory to Robertsfield and back.

Date: Saturday 26, 2005

Wallenford coffee factory is at Mt. Lebanon on the road between Content Gap and St. Peters. Robertsfield is near Mavis Bank. An early start should ensure a return to Kingston before dark. The walk takes about 2 hours each way. It's not particularly strenuous. There are 2 places where we must wade across the river. We shall pass the site of a historic garden. One of the bridges we cross still bears the owner's name. Of particular interest is the effect that hurricane Ivan and subsequent rains at the end of December had on the river's course, infrastructure and inhabitants particularly in the Robertsfield vicinity. The effects have been shown on the TV news more than once recently.

Moth & Butterfly Notes

A new record for us

On October 24, 2004 we were walking towards the Homework Centre on the UWI campus when Abigail saw some yellow caterpillars with blue and white stripes on a tree. We stopped to look at them more closely and saw them eating the yellow flowers. The flowers were way above our heads. We asked a gentleman to collect a few for us and placed them in a cup. He also gave us some of the flowers. We took them home to rear them. The caterpillars formed into green pupae. After the adults emerged we got them identified by Dr. Bailey who works in the Department of Life Sciences at UWI. They were *Phoebis sennae* sennae. She also identified the tree as Golden Shower Tree. It was the first time that we were seeing caterpillars on that tree.
